#### Practicum in a Montessori School

540 hours (min)

Expected length of time for completion: September-June (one complete school year)

The practicum period provides the student the opportunity to fully experience what is involved in being a Montessori teacher in the classroom from a practical viewpoint. Students are evaluated by the supervising teacher and observed and evaluated by a field consultant three to five times throughout the practicum year (minimum of four visits for a self-directed internship).

During the practicum year, students should expect to dedicate an additional six to eight hours per week to work outside the classroom:

- Completing six observations in Montessori classrooms with write-ups
- Preparing the Year-Long Project
- Preparing the resource manuals
- Writing monthly self-observation reports.

#### Evaluation and Review

#### hours included in Academic Phase

Expected length of time for completion: Up to one week in June following the practicum year Adult learners are evaluated to determine competency in understanding of Montessori philosophy and principles and use of the Montessori materials.

#### Evaluation consists of:

- 1. Final oral presentations of use of Montessori Materials (one hour minimum)
- 2. Written examinations on Montessori principles, philosophy, and materials (three hours minimum each)
- 3. Presentation of Resource Manuals
- 4. Presentation of Year-Long Project

Upon successful completion of the Early Childhood Course/all AMS requirements:

The director recommends the adult learner for an <u>AMS Early Childhood Credential</u> if the adult learner holds at minimum a Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited U.S college/university or its equivalent from a non-U.S. college/university, as determined by a recognized credential evaluation service.

An <u>AMS Early Childhood Credential</u> will also be recommended if the degree is officially determined not to be equivalent to a U.S. bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college/university, but still meets the nationally recognized post-secondary educational standard in the state, province, or country of issuance, including a normal program length of a minimum of three years. This credential will state the degree and country in which the degree was earned.

The director recommends the adult learner for an AMS Associate Early Childhood Credential if the adult learner holds a high school diploma, GED, or the international equivalent thereof, but not a Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited U.S. college/university or its equivalent as determined by a recognized credential evaluation service. Country, state, and local employment requirements change periodically and vary in different types of schools (e.g., private, public/charter, faith-based, publicly funded). In some locations or schools, an Associate Credential may not qualify for full teaching responsibility. Even if it is currently possible to qualify for full teaching responsibility without a Bachelor's degree, employment regulations may change in the future. The applicant is responsible for checking specific jurisdictions and schools for particular employment requirements.

Applicants for this AMS-affiliated Early Childhood course who do not have a Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited U.S college/university or its equivalent are required to sign a statement verifying that they have received the above information before they are considered for acceptance into this course. The official equivalency evaluation will be submitted to the AMS office of teacher education in place of the non-U.S. transcript for AMS's final decision.

AMS strongly encourages holders of the <u>AMS Associate Early Childhood Credential</u> to obtain their Bachelor's degree within seven years of credentialing. AMS hopes you consider your credential as the beginning of your journey of lifelong learning. Teachers with an Associate credential are eligible for an AMS Early Childhood Credential upon completing the Bachelor's degree requirement. To upgrade a credential, the teacher must be a current AMS member and send an official transcript documenting the Bachelor's degree with the credential upgrade fee to the AMS Office of Teacher Education.

## **Length of Course and Total Clock Hours**

The course in the Montessori curriculum is designed to be completed in two years as a part-time student for the first year and a full-time student during the second year. Nine-hundred, forty-seven and a half (947.5) total clock hours are required to complete the course of study to become a certified Montessori teacher. It is possible that students who are participating in a self-directed internship may take longer to complete their course material due to the challenge of completing the full workload while serving as a lead teacher. MMTEI will work with the student to design a schedule that meets his or her needs.

Three years from the end of the Academic Phase (Section II) is allowed to complete the program. If more than three years elapse, the student may apply for reinstatement into our program if he/she desires to continue. A yearly extension fee of \$300 per year will apply. The student will also be responsible for any increase in fees from our accrediting agencies.

Upon completion of all assignments and requirements and the payment of all moneys due, the student will receive a certificate from the American Montessori Society (see page 9). This certificate is the credential needed to teach as a head teacher in the Montessori classroom. All of the students who receive Montessori certification from this center enter the teaching profession with an in-depth knowledge of Montessori philosophy and are skilled in Montessori teaching strategies, as well as current educational methods that complement the Montessori approach.

#### **Description of Courses**

#### Philosophy—Foundations of Early Childhood

Online and in residence: Orientation to Montessori through guided readings in Montessori text books. The online course is held in the summer and is a prerequisite for the others. Assignments include weekly written assignments and discussions, as well as a final exam. Philosophy of the Montessori methods (materials and subject areas) is incorporated in the on-site academic phase and hours are counted in each subject.

#### Child Development

This online class, held in the spring of the practicum year, covers how the Montessori philosophy is used in early childhood education practices, along with the current implementation of the Montessori curriculum in today's classrooms. The course imparts an understanding of the physical, mental, emotional and social growth and development of the young child through the study of a variety of child psychologists and educators. Five written assignments and three written observations are required.

#### **Curriculum in Montessori Practical Life**

The development of order, concentration, coordination, and independence within the young child is rooted in the activities of Montessori's Practical Life curriculum. Students will learn to create activities and materials to enhance the child's growth in this area. Nutrition and fitness which includes the study of the basic nutritional, health and fitness needs of young children. Nutrients in foods as they affect physical and mental development will be identified.

#### **Curriculum in Montessori Sensorial**

The development and refinement of the senses is the purpose of this area of the classroom. In this course, students learn how to recognize the needs and abilities of the young child, and how to present the specific equipment designed by Dr. Montessori to further development of the total child.

#### **Curriculum in Montessori Math**

The development of the mathematical mind is the direct aim of the Montessori math materials for the young child. Using the materials designed by Dr. Montessori, students will learn how to spark the interest of the young child by sequentially teaching mathematical concepts.

#### **Curriculum in Montessori Language**

The student will learn techniques for developing a reading readiness curriculum for the class. Included will be skill development in storytelling, literature-based reading readiness, phonics, beginning reading activities, poetry, and song. The "whole language" approach is integrated with basic Montessori reading materials.

#### Classroom Leadership/Environmental Design

This online course explores strategies congruent with Montessori philosophy; utilizing aspects including environment preparation, positive discipline, observation, evaluation and parent communication. This class is designed to coordinate with the practicum year to create a positive community and improve the overall success of students as individuals and as a group.

#### **Montessori Science and Social Studies Subjects**

Zoology/Botany includes differences and similarities in fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals and the plant kingdom. The adult learner will be instructed in techniques to design activities for the preschooler. Astronomy/Physical Science includes ways to develop classroom activities that will present the fundamental concepts of astronomy, geology, physics and chemistry to young children. Geography/History includes materials and ideas to develop classroom activities that will present the fundamental concepts of air, water, the earth and land formations. History will be taught in the format of countries, flags and national costumes.

#### Music, Movement & Art

Students will be introduced to principles for teaching and using music in the classroom, and will acquire ideas for methods and materials in singing, rhythms, creative music and listening. Art includes a variety of techniques with a wide variety of art media. The emphasis will be on providing the young child with media for creative and individual expression. Fitness activities that can become a part of the daily curriculum will be presented.

Parent Involvement Clock Hours: 3

A presentation and discussion of existing strategies and methods used for parent communication and education, and how to implement these strategies into systems that generate collaboration between parents, teachers, family and community.

#### **Child Study through Observation**

This is a two-semester course focused on developing objectivity and proficiency in observing and interpreting child behavior. The adult learner will be required to study the behaviors of selected children in the student teaching classroom site, keep records on their observations and record ways to continue guiding the children on their paths. Record keeping will be checked at the January workshop, field consultant visits and must be turned in during the final evaluation workshop.

**Clock Hours: 13.5** 

#### Year-Long Project Clock Hours: 10

During the practicum year, the intern is required to complete a Year-Long Project and/or research to demonstrate understanding of designing, creating and sequencing Early Childhood learning in accordance with the Montessori philosophy of hands-on, concrete, manipulative, didactic and developmentally appropriate materials. A topic in the Science and Social Studies area reflecting the "needs of people" is preferred. Presentations occur during the final assessment week.

#### Organization/Reflection

Beginning with their admission interview and throughout the year, adult learners receive instruction regarding organizational methods, processes, and technology platforms required to succeed in MMTEI and specifically in their Montessori practicum experience.

Early Childhood Supervised Work Experience (Practicum) Clock Hours: 540 minimum
This is a two-semester course: Working in the classroom on a daily basis under the supervision of a
master teacher, the student will have an opportunity to observe and to put into practice all of the course
work required for a Montessori certification. A January workshop will provide a mid-year touchpoint
with instructors, along with intermittent synchronous zoom sessions.
